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The Fathers Absence

According to the U.S. Census bureau more than 25% of all children live without a father in the home. There are 10 million homes in the United States with single mothers, and there are 2 million homes with single fathers. The consequences of children growing up without a close connection to their biological fathers are life changing and can be disastrous. The website of the National Fatherhood Initiative reveals the positive and negative impacts of fathers who are actively involved in their children's lives:

- Children with their fathers in the home do better in school.
- Children with their fathers in the home are less likely to be abused.
- Children with their fathers in the home are less likely to be obese.
- Sons with a father in the home are less likely to go to prison.
- Children with their fathers in the home are less likely to live in poverty.

More points could be cited here, but it is clear children need their biological fathers just as much as they need their mothers.

God's word tell fathers to raise their children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord (Ephesians 6:4). Earthly fathers are tasked with the serious responsibility of bringing up their children to be faithful children of our heavenly Father. An absent father, even one who has visitation rights, is either totally incapable of fulfilling this duty, or he is severely handicapped.

The absence of biological fathers in the lives of children is largely the result of the absence of the eternal Father of all mankind in the lives of the general population. Without God and His word to

guide him, man experiences all manner of hardships and tragedies. The presence of our spiritual Father in our families prepares our children to be the parents they need to be for their children.

Brother Jesse L. Sewell, a gospel preacher from the mid-1800's, as quoted in his biography written by brother David Lipscomb, indicates children's training should begin 100 years before their birth. By that, he referred to the need for several generations of Christian living to be demonstrated by the grandparents and parents of the new generation of parents. By having the eternal Father influencing and shaping the lives of their forefathers, the new parents are more likely themselves to be able to properly train children in the way of righteousness.

Brother Sewell further expressed the idea that a child's training needs to begin before the child is three months old. How true this is. A child needs to see the overriding importance the parents place upon seeking a close and constant relationship with the Father above. This closeness is demonstrated by regular attendance at worship assemblies, daily Bible reading and study in the home, and a fervent prayer life. As children develop, they will also observe the parents efforts to conform their lives to that of the Savior. This will include a personality that exudes a loving, compassionate, and forgiving spirit. One more important trait the child should observe in their earthly father is a desire to share the gospel with the lost.

Our heavenly Father wants, "all men to be saved, and to come unto the knowledge of the truth" (1 Timothy 2:4). Jesus came to "seek and to save that which was lost" (Luke 19:10). These facts need to be firmly planted in the minds and hearts of every child of God. While our children are still young, they need to see and hear their fathers and mothers inviting friends and neighbors to worship services and Bible classes. Earthly fathers and mothers need to be involved in gospel meetings, mission campaigns, and other ways of sharing the gospel with the lost. By their actions, earthly parents will instill an urgency for evangelism and a love for the lost in their children, and bring about the next generation of fishers of men.

The church of our Lord is losing members and congregations in the United States at an alarming rate. The number of young men preparing to be gospel preachers and missionaries is decreasing. To reverse this trend, we must recapture the zeal of first century Christians who went everywhere preaching the word. Parents must place God the Father, His Son Jesus, and the Spirit inspired word as the central focus in their homes.

The Bible acknowledges man's faults, it is patient with man's weaknesses, it is severe with man's sins, and it is honest with his virtues and his hopes.

To own the Bible is to be rich. To study, to know, and to trust the Bible is to find life. To study the Bible is to be wise; to obey it, to be strong.

To know the Bible and to handle it aright is the greatest accomplishment within the reach of any person. One may know English, astronomy, literature, music, sociology, and philosophy; but if one does not know the Bible, one has failed in the only subject that brings all things into their proper relationship and that enables one to know life at its best.

The one who seeks to know the Bible will endeavor to study its contents book by book, meet its characters as they unfold through its pages, study its types, its doctrine, its topics, paragraphs, sentences and words. This is a lifetime work.

The Bible is the one book that can save many a heartache. The following was found on the flyleaf of a Bible placed by the Gideons in a motel in Birmingham, Alabama: "May God bless the man who placed this book here. I am a young lady twenty-one years old, fatherless and motherless. Tonight this book saved me from taking a wrong step. May the next reader find in it the comfort that I did."

There is no greater accomplishment in life than to be able to rightly divide the Word of truth. It is worth all the sacrifice that is necessary to give to such a study. One can never be great in the true sense of that word who does not know the Word, love it, live it, delight in it, and teach it without perversion and without misrepresentation.

The one who studies this book and knows how to handle it is in a position to render the greatest service in the world. No wonder Paul told Timothy: (1) to study, (2) to be a workman, and (3) to seek to be approved of God. There is no higher ambition on earth.

The Bible is a mirror that enables us to see ourselves. It is food which supplies the strength that we need, a lamp to guide our way, a hammer to break and to build, a sword to fight and to defend, the seed to plant and grow, and the goal to own and to become our reward.

There are no experiences in life for which the Bible does not furnish a passage. May these thoughts lend encouragement to all of us to become diligent students of the Word that we may know the way of life and find the life that is life indeed.
